### Series 2 - Writers and Journalists

Session 1: Friday 14 March

Being true, being fair: the challenges of biography

Presenter: Anne Manchester



**Bio**: Journalist Anne Manchester began her career working on the

Presbyterian and Methodist newspaper Crosslink, and later served as editor of the national nursing journal Kai Tiaki Nursing New Zealand.

She has published two books for children – Toughen Up, Andrew! and its prequel Andrew Down Under, The story of an immigrant dog – and a memoir, Memory Stick, in 2020.

Her biography of the New Zealand hymn writer Shirley Murray —Peace is Her Song, The life and legacy of Shirley Erena Murray — was published in September 2024.

Anne is also an actor and director for her local theatre group. In 2023, she directed and narrated a photographic tribute and film of Katherine Mansfield's story At the Bay.

Lyttleton since 1988. He is the author of more than 20 books, and writes for Christchurch newspaper The Press in columns syndicated throughout New Zealand.


Session 3: Friday 28 March
